Open front gates to plastic calf cubicles has been beneficial for easy calf access, better observation and air flow for the calves. After weaning, calves are moved to small groups of 10 to 12 in the same barn. This tour will also feature an on-farm demonstration focusing on sanitation.  Tour Stop B: Kutz Dairy Farm Growing calves to their peak potential is a vital element of success for Kutz Dairy Farm. This 2,200-head Jersey dairy pays very close attention to nutrition and the environment of their calves. They are fed pasteurized whole milk supplemented with a pasteurizer balancer. Calves and heifers are fed on the farm until reaching ~300 lb. after which they are sent to their heifer rearing facility in Nebraska.  This tour will also feature an on-farm demonstration highlighting the best practices of pasteurizing waste milk.
